our teaching staff having increasingly higher expectations of themselves and their students and seeking new and innovative ways to make learning engaging for all our students.

As a self-improving school, we are always looking at ways to raise standards and improve outcomes for our students. To support this whole school priority, we have invested in IRIS Connect to empower teachers to collaborate, reflect and share the many examples of excellence with each other across the school. Aspirations are high at Chamberlayne and our creative new curriculum offer in Year 10 is supporting our young people towards reaching their goals and realising their ambitions. You will have seen in our social media posts the success our Year 10 Construction students are already experiencing in their first term of their Level 2 course at City College. The course tutor has reported that they are making great progress and are already showing potential to be considered for apprenticeships. In addition, our Year 10 Psychologists have been busy out and about around the school conducting research activities including interviewing staff and students and observing lessons. After the Christmas break, they will sit their first full GCSE practise exam paper on 'Research Methods' - they should be revising thoroughly for this over the holiday!

While Year 10 are settling into their KS4 courses, Year 9 students are hearing about their success and are already excited about choosing their courses for next year. Our Preferences process starts in January with a special assembly for students in Year 9 on Friday 18th January, with the Preferences Evening for parents and students the following week, on Thursday 24th January at 6.30pm. Message from the Assistant Headteacher





Role and Responsibilities

As an exam invigilator your role and responsibilities will include:

- ensuring a calm environment which will give students the best possible opportunity to be successful in their exams
- helping to organise students at the start and end of each exam
- helping to provide the correct information and material for successful completion of the exam
- helping to ensure that the conduct of the exam takes place within the guidelines set down by the examination board and the school's Examination Policy
- being vigilant, whilst not disrupting the candidates
- reporting in the event of any discrepancy or irregularity in the progress of an examination directly to the examination officer
- collecting exam scripts in order, by candidate number

Please be aware that this role requires the invigilator to be able to **stand for the duration of the examination and the ability to move around the venue at regular intervals**.
